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Top Story

New Proton Therapy Center



Rady Children's, in collaboration with Scripps Health, is now the only center in California to provide proton therapy to children of all ages.

For certain cancers, proton therapy offers a more precise and aggressive approach to destroying cancerous and non-cancerous tumors, compared to X-ray radiation. Proton therapy involves the use of a controlled beam of protons to target tumors with a precision unavailable in other radiation therapies. The targeted delivery of proton energy limits damage to healthy surrounding tissue and allows for a more potent and effective dose of radiation to be used.

Rady Children's and Scripps will collaborate on treatment planning for pediatric patients and have worked together to design childspecific amenities to enhance the pediatric patient care experience.

Measles Alert!



There has been measles reported in 4 patients in San Diego County, including one 5 month old infant. It is important that we do what we can to prevent further cases.

Unimmunized children under 1 year of age, unimmunized pregnant women, and immunocompromised patients are at highest risk for developing disease and complications.

What to do if you suspect one of your patients has measles:

- 1. Keep the patient separated from other patients (consider having patients with suspected measles wait in the car until appropriate triage is done.)
- 2. Obtain a measles serology (IgM and IgG) if blood cannot be drawn in your office, notify laboratory in advance that a patient with possible measles is coming, so proper precautions can be taken by the lab to protect others in the waiting room.
- 3. Consider vitamin A if the child's nutritional status is questionable.
- 4. Educate parents and patients on the contagious period and the need to stay at home until no longer contagious (usually 5 days after the rash appears).
- 5. Report all suspected measles cases to the County of San Diego HHSA by calling 619-692-8661 or faxing the Confidential Morbidity Report form to 619-692-5677. The report can be downloaded at: http://sandiegohealth.org

Polio-Like Syndrome in California



The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) has been tracking cases of acute flaccid paralysis (AFP) of unknown etiology in California for the past several months. As of February 12, 2014, 20 cases (adults and children) have met the syndrome definition (CD Brief 14-07). Two San Diegans are in this group of cases, a 17 year old male and a 22 year old male were reported in 2012. Like all syndrome investigations, there

may be multiple unrecognized causes for these cases, but CDPH is being prudent to investigate all cases for an infectious etiology in case the syndrome is communicable and may be prevented.

Messages for parents:

 $1. \ There is no polio-like epidemic in San \ Diego, California or the \ US.$

Before the polio vaccine, in a single year (1952), 21,000 cases of paralytic polio were reported in the US.

2. The San Diego and California state health departments are doing their job of investigating possible new contagious diseases.

We fully support their efforts to protect children. They may find nothing, or they may find a cause; they are just investigating now.

3. Make sure that all children are immunized against polio.

Polio is the only Enterovirus which preferentially and routinely infects nerves that control muscles.

In addition to providing expert care, the center conducts research to better understand the cause of these disorders and to develop more effective therapies. We also provide a setting to train fellows, residents and medical students in caring for these patients, thereby increasing awareness of these conditions among future clinicians. Rady Children's has been working on a number of initiatives to respond to the Winter census surge and have created a surge plan to meet the demands in the ED. Some of the improvements we have made are:

- Expanding capacity for Medical/Surgical Patients
 - o Opening of PACU Pod A for OR holds
 - o Opening of Medical North Pod C for admissions
 - o Additional NICU beds to be used for overflow
- Working with AMN Healthcare to increase our nursing coverage as well as our pool of providers which will give us greater staffing flexibility and also increase the number of shifts we provide.





Specialty Access Update

Our organization has made a commitment to provide timely care to our patients. The goal of the Specialty Access Initiative is to achieve 3rd Next Available of 5 days or less for non-urgent new patients in all specialties and to maintain delay at that level. For fiscal year 2014, a goal has been set to have 10 divisions achieve delay of 5 days or less. In order to achieve this goal, we vigorously monitor system performance using a "dashboard" measuring Delay, Demand, Supply, and Activity. From the data, we can adjust with purpose to achieve our goals for our patients.







In an effort to provide physicians and managers with real-time monitoring for Specialty Access, the "Specialty Access Dashboard" is being created. The Specialty Access Dashboard tracks Delay, Demand, Activity, and Supply by division to enable MPF leadership, Division Chiefs, and Division Template Coordinators to identify trends in the metrics and take appropriate actions. **Currently, the delay, demand, and activity portions of the website are live for all specialties.** Supply is expected to be ready over the next few weeks.



Stair Falls: Caregiver's "Missed Step" as a Source of Childhood Fractures

Published February 2014 in the Journal of Children's Orthopaedics



A study was done between 2004 and 2012 in which 16 children sustained a fracture after a fall down the stairs while being carried by a caregiver.



The goal of this study was to identify injuries that may occur when a caretaker falls while carrying a child on a stairway, to understand the pathomechanics of this injury, and to perform a cost analysis of the injury.
