### TODAY'S TIP: Practicing Play— Provided by Angela Patricelli, M.A., BCBA

Play dates can be a fun and beneficial way for children to interact with peers and develop further social competence. Always strive to have a plan and structure the play date. For example: a short 15 minute activity, snack time, a second 15 minute activity, and then clean up. Always include reinforcing activities and adult facilitation to help your child use his or her communication. This will ensure your child feels successful during the interaction and will want to have another play date.

## RESEARCH CORNER

Classroom Pivotal Response Teaching (CPRT) is a naturalistic behavioral intervention for students with autism in preschool through 3rd grade that is specifically designed for teachers. A team of researchers, teachers, and school administrators collaboratively developed the intervention based on the evidence-based practice, Pivotal Response Training (PRT). Focus groups of teachers reported on the difficulties of using PRT in the classroom, and possible adaptations to the difficult components were tested empirically by researchers. The team developed new data collection worksheets, training materials, and case examples to make CPRT maximally applicable to the needs of the classroom. The new program was recently pilot tested in 20 local classrooms. Preliminary results support the teachers' ability to use CPRT with fidelity within their daily occurring classroom activities as well as student gains in engagement and communication skills after receiving the intervention.

## SUCCESS STORIES

Recently highlighted in the Kids' NewsDay insert of the Union Tribune newspaper, Anna Bowen's story of progress is an inspiration to many families. Diagnosed at Rady Children's Hospital with ASD at the age of 3, Anna's main areas of need were social interactions with peers and flexibility with change. Through PC-DBT (Parent-Child Developmental Behavioral Therapy) and social skills group interventions, Anna has made significant progress. "Anna has really blossomed in the last two years," says her mother. Not only has Anna met her goals, but she is also learning that play and engagement with peers can be fun. That is progress indeed!



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
