

## I'm Going to See the Hearing Doctor.

Earmold Impression





### A note to caregivers:

This book will detail the steps of an earmold impression at the Rady Children's Audiology Department.

In this story we refer to the audiologist as a "Hearing Doctor" and refer to an earmold as "clay." You can determine which language is best to use for your child.

Some children benefit from distraction (during the appointment) and others benefit from a reward after completing the earmold impression. If your child would benefit from a prize/reward after completing the ear mold, we recommend bringing this with you to the clinic. You can add this to the visual at the end of the story (e.g., "First clay, then [insert prize here]"). See final page for example. We have also included a visual schedule on the last page of this story.

We also recommend filling out the Autism Friendly Questionnaire in MyChart in preparation of your visit. If you experience difficulty filling out the form in MyChart, then you may download a paper copy from our website and bring it with you to the appointment.




I'm going to see the hearing doctor to make an earmold.







I will check in at the front desk.








## Now I will wait until they call my name.

It's ok to feel nervous.


If I am nervous, then I can [insert item you brought from home].

I can count to 5 when they look in each ear.






Now the doctor will put a tiny sponge and string in my ear to protect it.

It will not hurt.








Now the doctor will mix the clay.

Next, the doctor will put the clay in my ear.

It will feel cold and wet.





I will wait for the clay to dry.

I can set a timer for 5 minutes.

clay to dry.










When the timer rings, the doctor will take the clay out.








I did a great job helping the doctor make my earmolds.

Please customize with a picture of what your child is motivated to earn on the next page.



#### **Visual Schedules**

If your child benefits from the use of visual schedules, the next page may be helpful. As you point to each picture, you can briefly explain what will happen:

First, the doctor will look in your ears with a special flashlight.

Next, they will put a tiny sponge and string in your ear to protect it.

Then, the doctor will put clay in your ear. It will feel cold and wet.

We will wait 5 minutes. When the timer rings, the doctor will take the clay out.

Then you will be all done and can [insert reward here]!
